

Douglas County Indigenous Food System Study and Action Plan Douglas County Food Policy Council STAGE 1: DCFPC PROJECT INTRODUCTION, CULTURAL TRAINING, AND PLANNING

The "Douglas County Indigenous Food System Study and Action Plan" will provide critical data from Indigenous (Native American) food entrepreneurs such as: farmers, chefs, food retailers, value added producers, Indian Taco pop-ups, and agritourism businesses, to enhance the Indigenous foods sector in Douglas County, Kansas. There are about 3,239 residents in Douglas County who identify as Native American and represent more than 145 Tribal Nations. The top five Tribal Nations represented in Douglas County are the Navajo Nation, Cherokee Nation, Muscogee (Creek) Nation, Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe, and the Oglala Sioux Tribe.

Culture affects how people communicate, understand, and respond to information. Cultural and linguistic competency is integral to the success of this project. Douglas County is leading with equity by hiring experts from the *Indigenous Community Center (ICC)* to serve as community liaisons and working closely with *Multispective Health Research and Consulting LLC* to conduct surveys, interviews, and host community focus groups. Douglas County Food Policy Council (DCFPC) will support hired experts through the data gathering process and present recommendations from the study to the City of Lawrence and Douglas County, KS.

The <u>Douglas County Food System Plan</u> was written with cultural equity in mind, but the county does not have sufficient information nor data to support our historically underserved Indigenous populations. Executing the proposed "Douglas County Indigenous Food System Study and Action Plan" now, is of high priority and need to our local government, food policy council (and councils across the state), and to our local Indigenous communities. It is timely for Douglas County to develop the "Douglas County Indigenous Food System Study and Action Plan" within the next two years. This timeline will give Douglas County government and the Douglas County Food Policy Council enough time to gather data and expert recommendations to support the needs of our unique Indigenous populations before starting the planning process of the next iteration of the Douglas County Food System Plan in 2026. By carrying out this study and action plan, the next ten-year food system plan will include research-based food policies that support the needs of Indigenous food entrepreneurs and connected economic communities at large.
